PASTOR'S CORNER!

Stay Woke!



"Stay Woke!" is a phrase that was born in the African American Community as a reminder of our need to be aware or vigilant of what is going on around us. Staying Woke is also about knowledge or being enlightened by the truth. In light of the current racial and political divisions, it behooves us all to "stay woke."

If "stay woke!" is about being aware, alert, vigilant or knowledgeable, then what drives the likes of Ron DeSantis and Donald Trump to spin the phrase as something detrimental to white people? Governor DeSantis signed a bill in April 2022 that was designed to protect Floridians from what he called "discrimination and woke indoctrination."

He has masterfully taken the word "woke" and spun it as some sinister agenda of the left wings to indoctrinate or discriminate against white kids. He labelled being woke as a left-wing agenda to rewrite the history of slavery and racism in this country. In other words, according to DeSantis and Trump's Republican Party, the truth about slavery and racism is not the truth that the white supremacist wants told.

The white supremacist's attempt to stop the "stay woke" movement is really not about protecting their kids. It is about denying their children the truth that would enlighten them to the shameful racist past of this country. No! 

Richmond community members enjoyed a glimpse into the past during celebrations for Maggie L. Walker's 159th Birthday at Third Street Bethel AME Church and her national historic site in Jackson Ward on July 15. The day involved a wreath ceremony, arts and crafts, the chance to tour the Maggie Walker House, a film about her life and a re-enactment of Ms. Walker's historic 1901 speech by the Rev. Veronica Carter.

The church worked with the National Park Service, the City of Richmond and the Black History Museum to plan events over three days. Julia Turner, one of the co-chairs involved in organizing Saturday's festivities, said a highlight of this year's celebrations was the emphasis placed on involving youths with craft activities that engaged them in the celebration.

Celebrating Maggie L. Walker's 159th Birthday Contd!

"For some, this was the first time they had an opportunity to tour Maggie Walker House," Ms. Turner said in an email. "I was quite amazed in showing the film how many people, although they'd heard of her, did not know her story."

Mrs. Walker was born in Richmond in 1864. She was an entrepreneur and a civic leader who went on to become the first Black woman to establish and serve as president of a bank in

the United States.

Her 1901 speech to the Independent Order of St. Luke was the start of making her dream of a Black bank, the Saint Luke Penny Savings Bank, a reality. Not only was this moment captured by Rev. Carter's re-enactment, the penny banks that were decorated during the arts and crafts portion of the program recreated an initiative of Mrs. Walker to encourage deposits by children and teach them about savings and the importance of thrift.

The St. Luke Penny Savings Bank opened its doors in 1903. In the 1930s it merged with two other banks to form Consolidated Bank and Trust Company and Mrs. Walker served as the combined banks board chair until her death from diabetic panerene in 1934 at the age of 70.

The Legend of the Two Wolves

The legend of the two wolves, often attributed to Native American folklore, can be connected to certain biblical scriptures that address the battle between good and evil, the choices we make, and the nature of our inner selves.

The legend of the two wolves tells the story of a Cherokee elder who is teaching his grandson about life. He describes a constant battle that takes place within each person between two wolves. One wolf represents evil, characterized by anger, envy, greed, arrogance, and other negative qualities. The other wolf represents good, embodying love, kindness, compassion, humility, and other positive virtues. The grandson asks which wolf will win the battle, to which the elder replies, "The one you feed."

This legend reflects the biblical teachings about the battle between good and evil and the choices we make. In the Bible, the apostle Paul writes in his letter to the Galatians (Galatians 5:16-17 (NIRV)): "So I say, live by the Holy Spirit's power. Then you will not do what your desires controlled by sin want you to do. The desires controlled by sin do not want what the Spirit delights in. And the Spirit does not want what the desires controlled by sin delight in. The two are at war with each other. That is why you are not supposed to do whatever you want."

This passage emphasizes the inner struggle between our fleshly desires, which can be likened to the wolf representing evil, and the promptings of the Holy Spirit, which can be associated with the wolf representing good. It suggests that our choices and actions determine which wolf we feed and allow to prevail in our lives.

The legend of the two wolves and the biblical scriptures conveys a similar message about the battle between good and evil within us. They emphasize the importance of making conscious choices that align with virtuous values and the prompting of the Spirit, rather than indulging in negative traits and actions. Both narratives encourage individuals to nurture the qualities that promote love, kindness, and compassion, which ultimately lead to a more fulfilling and virtuous life.


